Roundtable Highlights Shaw Family Business Success

The Graceland University Entrepreneurial Roundtable is focused on an important topic: free enterprise and entrepreneurship. It provides students with an opportunity to integrate their academic studies with practical lessons from leaders from the business world. Faculty provide theoretical perspectives, students bring fresh insights by questioning assumptions, and the Roundtable event encourages a dialogue and an opportunity for networking.

This year, the 23rd Roundtable was a veritable feast of information, as JR and Carol Shaw and their four children shared openly about the strengths and challenges of running a family business — in their case, the far-reaching Canadian enterprises Shaw Communications and Corus.

On April 17, the agenda opened to a full auditorium in the Shaw Family Auditorium in Shaw Center, named for the family, on Graceland University's Lamoni campus, with fast-paced videos on the history and corporate culture of Shaw Communications and Corus Entertainment Inc. The companies provide cable and satellite TV, internet, digital phone services and operate Canada's second largest private conventional television network and 19 specialty TV networks. JR Shaw's keynote address outlined the history and philosophy of the company, starting with the family farm in Ontario on which JR, his brother and sisters grew up under loving and insightful instruction from their parents.

JR, his wife Carol and children, Brad, Jim, Julie and Heather took questions from the audience in three breakout sessions focusing on different aspects of running a successful family business: governance, work/life balance, and multigenerational success. Students appreciated the openness of the family in sharing how they confront differences, find time for spouses and children outside of work, and think about the role their children and grandchildren might play in the companies' future.

Part of the Shaw family philosophy is that they share the blessings from their business ventures with those less fortunate. All four children, along with JR and Carol, have strong commitment to philanthropic efforts, especially for children. In his introduction of the program, Graceland University President John Sellars movingly recalled his experiences in the Philippines when he saw firsthand the impact of Shaw contributions to the lives of impoverished farm families. Carol has been active in a local AIDS network and has contributed to AIDS relief in Africa. Brad and his family support an orphanage in Tibet, while Jim, Julie and Heather each have their own projects that benefit children.

The Entrepreneurial Roundtable was able to bring the Shaw family business success' to focus while allowing students insights into their visionary leadership. The Roundtable is sponsored by the Charles Sandage Center for the Study of Free Enterprise and Entrepreneurship. Justin Akers directs the program under the supervision of the Sandage School of Business.



Community Building: Graceland and Community of Christ

The Graceland Experience is one-of-a-kind. Graceland University is home of an ongoing Community of Christ young adult leadership initiative: the Community of Christ Leadership Program, or CCLP. It is a partnership between Community of Christ and Graceland University. Each year, CCLP involves between 50 to 60 students. It combines financial assistance, leadership training and spiritual growth opportunities for Gracelanders who want to deepen their connection with Community of Christ through developing their gifts for ministry and pursuing church mission.

This year, CCLP partnered with Colonial Hills Congregation for a mutual ministry opportunity. The partnership provided a chance for Graceland students to exercise their gifts for ministry, and strengthen ties between Graceland and Community of Christ through the Go GU! Program. The Go GU! Program appoints congregational representatives whose role is to assure that members are kept informed about Graceland and the role it plays in the mission of the church.

The retreat's directors, Katie Arnold-Clow and Amy Sellars, worked closely with Melanie Grimes, Graceland's CCLP Director, planning and organizing the weekend. The day of the retreat, 15 CCLP students joined over a hundred members of the Colonial Hills congregation at Camp Doniphan for a weekend of community building, learning and renewal. Exploring the theme, "We Are the Body," CCLP students taught classes on Corinthians 12:12. They led campfire, games, activities, and prepared an evening worship on Saturday.

At the weekend's closing service, CCLP students joined the congregation in sharing testimonies of how blessed they were by God's Spirit during the weekend. Colonial Hill's member Gretchen Booz summed up the weekend well by saying, "There was instant bonding of the congregation with all the Graceland folks. They had us singing, dancing, laughing, worshiping and crying. Following the Sunday fellowship service, it was difficult to say goodbye."

Youth Launch Commission



Graceland is committed to fulfilling the vision of "inspiring and empowering persons for transformational service and leadership." The creation and expansion of programs that improve Graceland's focus on civic engagement are examples of that commitment. The Youth Launch Commission (YLC), a consortium of new and existing Graceland service programs in the Affiliate Relations area, is one specific example of that effort.

The driving mission of YLC is to strengthen the culture of positive youth development and civic engagement in Southern Iowa through education, volunteerism and service learning delivered through four programs -AmeriCorps Youth Launch, RSVP, Volunteer Center of Southern Iowa, and Youth Launch Leaders.

AmeriCorps Youth Launch (AYL) provides youth-development initiatives through service in schools and other youth organizations. Twenty-five AmeriCorps members assist students in achieving academic engagement and educational success through building developmental assets, creating community connections and fostering civic engagement.

RSVP of Southern Iowa is dedicated to connecting senior volunteers to community organizations with a focus on early childhood literacy and disaster response. RSVP of Southern Iowa believes the skills of seniors should be utilized to the benefit of local communities. In addition to sharing skills, intergenerational relationships are valuable and should be leveraged to benefit the local community.

The Volunteer Center of Southern Iowa (VCSI) strives to boost volunteerism at Graceland and in the surrounding communities by connecting the skills of people, especially youth and young adults, with the needs in the area. VCSI hopes to ignite volunteers to be part of the solution to community challenges and assist organizations in engaging volunteers in meaningful service.

Youth Launch Leaders (YLL) is a program that provides training opportunities and support to adult leaders of youth activities in the areas of child and adolescent growth and development. YLL resources include training seminars, fact sheets, newsletters and links to online resources and webinars, all utilizing the 40 Developmental Assets designed by Search Institute. Through the program, adult youth leaders become proficient in the skills necessary for creating environments where youth can grow and develop. "The Youth Launch Commission programs bring together students, staff, faculty and community members to create civic-minded, service oriented community leaders. We are proud to be part of the effort to make Graceland's vision of transformational service a reality" said Executive Director of Affiliate Relations, Greg Sutherland.

She has invested her life, developing friendships here on "the Hill."



Schaal graduated from Graceland with a Bachelor of Arts in social studies in 1980, and earned a master's in religion with honors in 1985 from Park College, with an emphasis in advanced leadership studies. He was a member of the Graceland Board of Trustees until 2013 when he became a part-time field officer for Institutional Advancement. He also served several years as one of two counselors to Community of Christ President Stephen M. Veazey.

The House Built on Prayer: A Community of Service through Faith and Love

Tricia Brashear '93, RN, BSN, CHPN, clinical manager at Saint Luke's Home Care and Hospice, is one of the special ones. She is a Graceland nurse with a unique gift of caring for people during their life-ending journey.

For her and those in her profession, it is a commitment of community service inspired by faith and love. The 25 clinical staff members hired by Brashear operate as a family with compassionate caring. They work hard to create a home-like experience for the patients and their families. "It is just a part of who we are;" stated Tricia, "the shared experience makes us one."

Tricia knew she would be a nurse from an early age.

At 12, she started working at the Independence Regional Health Center as a hospital volunteer. After two years at a local community college, she continued her nursing education at Graceland's School of Nursing. She came to appreciate the relationships she developed with her instructors and classmates, with Professor Shirley Dauzvardis being a particular favorite. Tricia started her nursing career in oncology, but now realizes that she did hospice care all along.

Being in a faith-based environment is important to Tricia. So, when Independence Regional closed, she went to work for another faith based non-profit, Saint Luke's Home Care and Hospice. She participated on the planning committee for building the Saint Luke's Hospice House, and has been an integral part of this exciting start-up since the beginning. (It has been a 7-year dream!) It opened in 2013 and is the only free-standing craftsman style Hospice House, complete with an outdoor chapel in the heart of Kansas City.

The 22,500-square-foot "home" allows a family the chance to experience a meaningful and less-stressful end of life period with their loved ones. It is a 12 bed facility with medical technology and the comforts of home. Tricia headed up a china drive, so eating at the "House" would be like eating at her grandmother's table. She also worked to collect soft t-shirts and nightgowns so the patients don't wear hospital gowns. As part of its mission, Hospice House focuses on giving these individuals relief from the burden of their health issues. "These patients would otherwise be hospitalized," Tricia said. She explained that the level of care necessary keeps these patients from going home. She added that, "This is a better option to manage their needs, and that is a blessing."

Knowing the importance her faith would make in her own service for the patients of Hospice House, Tricia initiated the idea that the house literally be built on prayers. So board members, nurses and staff who helped develop the Hospice House handwrote prayers, which were placed inside the walls before the sheet rock went up. The prayers represent many religions. "It's what hospice is specifically about; celebrating and supporting people in their beliefs and all walks of life as they face the end of life." Brashear said. *~Nona Cady*





Graceland University Nursing Recognitions

The pinning ceremony for nursing students is a long held tradition where the newly graduated nurses are presented with pins to welcome them to the profession. Graceland has expanded the ceremony to include further recognitions of achievements and degrees.

In the fall of 2011, the School of Nursing admitted the first doctoral students in the history of Graceland University. At Commencement, May 18, 2014, in Lamoni, Iowa, the first doctoral graduates were "hooded" and awarded the Doctor of Nursing Practice (DNP) degree. All of the DNP graduates are alumni, having earned one or more nursing degrees from the Graceland University School of Nursing. Dustin Williams, the first student to complete the degree requirements in the fall of 2013, earned all three of his nursing degrees (BSN, MSN and DNP) from Graceland.

On Friday evening, May 16, 2014, graduates from the doctoral program were presented and celebrated for the first time at the School of Nursing Recognition Ceremony (NRC) in Independence, Missouri, at the Community of Christ Temple. Five of the six DNP graduates, as well as 35 distance students from all over the U.S., were in attendance. Eight GU Board of Trustees members also attended to mark this historical event. This was the largest assembly in NRC history, with well over 600 attendees!

Significant changes were made to the NRC to accommodate the addition of doctoral students and highlight the value of advanced education in nursing. Dustin Williams gave remarks for the graduate students. Graduates were recognized



Record Breaking Graceland Tennis Teams go to NAIA National Championships

The men's and women's Yellowjackets tennis teams won their conference championships and went to nationals! Going to nationals meant a 19 hour bus ride to Mobile, Alabama, making it an even more memorable experience.

The four day event included travel, training sessions with Xavier University at the University of Moblie, a community service project – a free tennis clinic for local youth at the Mobile Tennis Center, a Championship Banquet, tournament play and lots of team bonding.

The women's tennis team finished the season with a record of 15-4 and won their first national tournament match in Graceland's history. "We had the highest ranking ever in HAAC history at number 12," shared head coach Monroe Walker.

The men's team finished the season ranked 13th with an overall record of 12-6, a third straight conference championship, and a third straight national tournament appearance.

"Both teams had a great season," said Coach Walker. "To be able to go to nationals together was great for both programs."





Baughman Athletic Center Connects to the Community

hen Madolyn (Rae) and Doyle Baughman were updating their wills last year, they wanted to include Graceland University in their plans.

Kelly Everett proposed they do something that would benefit Graceland University as well as the Lamoni community, as Madolyn's family hailed back to the 1800s in this area. There has been a building right in the middle of town that for several years has only been used as a storage facility, and had become somewhat of an eyesore. It had potential to become something more. With the generous gift from the Baughmans, this storage building has been transformed and is now the Baughman Athletic Center (BAC).

With the return of the Graceland University wrestling program, there was a need for a facility in which Graceland could hold practices and solidify their team. The BAC has a large wrestling room with a custom-raised floor that offers some flexibility for the wrestlers as they throw down their opponents. It has heating and air conditioning to allow year-round availability, which will create the opportunity for Graceland to offer wrestling clinics in the summer. With a locker room, showers, laundry facilities, a training room and office, the Baughman Athletic Center will help the wrestling program create a winning team.

In addition to wrestling facilities, the BAC also has a room with batting cages, and can be used for pitching practice. The Graceland University softball and baseball teams will now be able to practice right in Lamoni, without having to drive to batting cages out of town. The Lamoni High School teams will be able to use them, as well as the Lamoni little league teams.

"Our roots are here in Lamoni so, when we came back to the community 15 years ago, we wanted to help out Graceland as well as the entire community," said Doyle as he toured the new facility that bears his name. Doyle and Madolyn have an open invitation to watch the upcoming wrestling practices in the new Baughman Athletic Center this fall.



Graceland University Selected for ACE Change and Innovation Lab

National Initiative Focused on Increasing First-generation and Nontraditional Student Attainment Rates

Graceland University has been selected by the American Council on Education (ACE) to participate in the Change and Innovation Lab (CIL), an initiative to help universities implement sustainable efforts to increase the number of first-generation and nontraditional students who gain a college degree.


Graceland is one of nine institutions that will work during the 18-month CIL project to implement concrete steps on their campuses, and identify how some of these practices can be applied broadly at colleges and universities across the country. The project is being generously supported by a \$400,000 grant from Lumina Foundation.

"The support ACE is providing our institution through this program will help us become more student-centered and strategic as we focus on the future." -President John Sellars.

"The institutions that are participating

in the Change and Innovation Lab are engaged in meaningful exploration of initiatives aimed at mobilizing higher education to increase student success and attainment nationwide," said ACE President Molly Corbett Broad. "We are grateful to Lumina Foundation for its support of this project, as well as for its continuing focus on improving postsecondary attainment."

ACE convened the initial meeting of the CIL earlier this month in Washington, D.C. The meeting was attended by campus teams that included each institution's president or chancellor and chief academic officers, including Graceland University President John Sellars; Vice President for Academic Affairs, Tammy Everett; Vice President for Student Life, David Schaal; and Director of Institutional Research, Debbie Kepple-Mamros. The criteria for selecting CIL institutions was designed to encourage high-access institutions to participate, including colleges and universities that enroll large numbers of Pell Grant recipients, have a history of serving or the capacity to serve posttraditional learners, and are interested in using technology and data to improve attainment rates.



Steve Anders to Teach Summer Course at University of Prishtina

Five Fulbright connections among a current full-time faculty of 87 is a remarkable achievement," commented Graceland President John Sellars on hearing the news that Dr. Steve Anders will teach this summer in Kosovo as a Fulbright Specialist.

The University of Prishtina in Kosovo has selected Dr. Anders to participate in the institution's 2014 International Summer University. Dr. Anders, Dean of the Sandage School of Business and the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences at Graceland, will teach "Intermediate Microeconomic Theory." The course will emphasize forces and structures in free markets in a part of the world that for 50 years made economic decisions under a centralized communist system.

Bob and Barbara Mesle: International Scholars for Graceland

The "Doctors Mesle," Bob and Barbara, are still going strong after 33+ years of teaching at Graceland, representing Graceland as scholars around the world. Their world view expands the classroom borders and engages students here on "the Hill." The Mesles exemplify the Graceland motto, "prudens future," which is Latin for "wisdom for the future," a wisdom that embraces a global community.

Last July in Pamplona, Spain, Barbara spoke on "Empiricism, Pragmatism, Naturalism, and Feminism — Jane Addams as a Case Study in Sympathetic Knowledge" to the international meeting of the Institute for American Religious and Philosophical Thought. Bob spoke on "Crazy Love: Articulating and Defending the Utilitarian Vision." While there, they ate in one of Hemmingway's favorite haunts. They then traveled to the University of Athens, Greece, for the World Congress of Philosophy, where Bob spoke on "Teaching Love as a Continually Transcending Ideal," the only Englishspeaking presenter in his section.

This summer Bob and Barbara will return to Greece in June, where Bob will be a keynote speaker and panelist at the 6th International Symposium on Process Organization Studies, on the Isle of Rhodes. In conjunction with the conference, Bob has agreed to contribute chapters to two books: one for Oxford University Press and the other for the

In July, Bob and Barbara will be traveling to China for their fourth turn at teaching the Process Philosophy Academy, and speaking at various conferences. The Academy will study the Chinese translation of Bob's book *Process Relational Philosophy*. Two of Bob's presentations in China have also been published in scholarly journals there.

Bob's book *Process Theology: A Basic Introduction,* has been translated into

Chinese, Korean, Japanese and most recently, Portuguese. Bob and Barbara are also regular contributors to www. jesusjazzbuddhism.org, with readers in about 40 countries. Bob has been asked to be a featured author, and some of Bob's short essays have also been translated into Chinese.

The Doctors Mesle are representing Graceland University around the world as international scholars, bringing all of their experience and study back so scholarship and teaching come together in their classrooms.

Don H. Compier's Scholarship Recognized in Christian Century

A s dean of Graceland's Community of Christ Seminary, Don H. Compier has plenty to keep him occupied.



He is frequently on the road to meet face to face with current and prospective students and supporters. "I have found there is no substitute for live engagement," Compier says, adding that "seminary education is very personal and relational."

Yet Dean Compier also believes that he must remain involved in research and writing. "Our faculty will continue to be lively teachers because they always learn more themselves," he says. He believes that "as dean, it is essential to model these high standards." In addition, Compier is seeking to attract students not only from Community of Christ, but other denominations as well. He shares that "publishing can enhance our seminary's reputation and demonstrate that we are involved in debates essential to all Christians and indeed all persons."

Don has authored texts on rhetorical theology and the thought of 16th century reformer John Calvin. He is the co-editor of *Empire and the Christian Tradition* (Fortress, 2007), named Best Reference

Book of the Year by the influential Academy of Parish Clergy. Yet his latest book, *Listening to Popular Music* (Fortress, 2013), has garnered more attention than any of his previous works. Compier explains that "music has always been a great passion of mine, so this one came from the heart. And I think music attracts the interest of people who might be intimidated by what they consider abstract theology." He has lectured on aspects of this book at Graceland and at University of Central Missouri, Seattle University, and Austin Presbyterian Theological Seminary.

Dean Compier was pleasantly surprised to learn that in its spring 2014 issue, the widely read magazine *Christian Century* recommended his book as one of the ten best reads in the field of ethics. *Christian Century* is the leading periodical in ecumenical Christianity, read by many pastors, theologians and lay people of many denominations. "I am very humbled by this wonderful recognition," Compier says.

Being Chairman of the Graceland Board of Trustees has been one of the most satisfying roles of my life. My term ended at the May board meeting. My commitment to Graceland continues.

I have received a number of congratulations and thanks for the things that were accomplished over the last seven years. Most of those things were really the work of others. However, I have always said it's better to be lucky than good. I have been lucky to have been Chairman when so many good things happened at Graceland.

Despite the fact that we went through one of the most challenging economic situations since the Great Depression, Graceland was able to do great things over the last seven years.

We were able to complete Resch Science and Technology Hall, the Small and Thomas Apartments, the Fitzgerald Fitness Center, the Shaw Center expansion and renovation, and the Graybill restrooms and lounge renovations. All told, over \$35,000,000 worth of improvements. Many people have said that the campus has never looked better.

Last fall's incoming class numbers were larger than they have been for a decade. We expect that trend to continue to 1200 students, full capacity, in a few years.

The percentage of Community of Christ freshman students also increased, as did

overall freshman GPA and ACT scores.

Graceland has always had excellent faculty, staff and administrators. Many have stayed at Graceland even though they could have moved elsewhere. One of the most vexing problems has been how to compensate our faculty, staff and administrators fairly. We commissioned a study that told us where we were compared to our peer institutions on compensation, and President Sellars just announced intent to get the faculty and staff more equitable wages.

As important as these accomplishments are, we balanced our budget and significantly decreased our reliance on our principal asset, SkillPath Seminars. SkillPath has been a tremendous asset to Graceland delivering over \$110,000,000 to the operating budget since it was acquired. SkillPath had always been viewed as an asset of the endowment, not as a proper major component of our operating income stream. We will soon be able to utilize SkillPath for more traditional endowment related purposes.

All this adds up to an institution that has never been stronger. I would be



remiss if I didn't point out some of the contributors who were so integral to Graceland's success. This could not have been done without the contribution of the Board of Trustees, their leadership and innovative ideals set the stage. The administration has also labored diligently to find the efficiencies necessary for the accomplishments I outlined above. We owe a debt of thanks to our faculty who have trusted the leadership enough to allow us time to do what we said we would do. Finally, to the alumni who supported our efforts at every stage, we all say thanks.

Dr. Oliver "Ollie" C. Houston, Jr. passed away on March 1, 2014. With 49 years on the Graceland music faculty, Ollie taught over 800 music theory and organ students and was a music legend on the Graceland campus. Offering his ministry of music over so many decades Dr. Houston's legacy continues in the lives he influenced.

The gentle manner and amazing recall that hallmarked Ollie's teaching was inspirational. He published anthems, songs and hymn compositions, while quietly contributing to the musical influence of the students he supported.

He demonstrated that it is possible to make a real difference just by attending the programs, listening to the ministry of musicians both young and old in our congregations, and letting them know we appreciate their efforts." – Blake West, EdD

In addition to his influence at Graceland, Dr. Houston offered years of organ recitals at the Community of Christ Auditorium organ, where he would often chat with the listeners afterward about technique, the specific nuances of the organ, and about the power of music that meant so much to him. Franklin S. Hough, president of Graceland from 1977-1980, passed away on May 19, 2014. Frank had a tremendous impact on the Graceland Experience. He loved teaching and inspired his students with his contagious enthusiasm. Frank was a Lamoni entrepreneur with a large smile and a can-do attitude.

Dr. Steve Anders, Dean of the C.H. Sandage School of Business, states: "We were truly blessed as a result of experiencing Frank as our professor in economics. Many of us were attracted to the major because of his 'bigger than life' personality. He could be on a tractor in the field, on the ground



sorting cattle, and in the classroom, all before noon on any given day. His business and farming activities provided a steady stream of humor and economic examples in his classes. His influence and impact on the Graceland community was profound and far reaching. He will be missed."

Before serving as president, Frank served as professor of economics, chair of the Division of Social Science and Dean of Faculty. His sense of humor and engaging classroom skills endeared him to students and colleagues alike, and he used his considerable financial skills to create innovative, new Graceland programs. After resigning as Graceland president, Frank returned to the classroom until MS forced him to retire in 1988, when he received the Graceland Distinguished Service Award.
